

HISTORY OF THE ROYAL PATRONAGE

The first royal patronage of Leander occurred in 1936 when the Prince of Wales ascended the throne as King Edward VIII. He was already a member in his own right, having been elected whilst still an undergraduate at Magdalen College, Oxford in 1913. A letter of invitation had been sent to the Prince's equerry, Major the Hon. WJ Cadogan, and the election followed the Prince's indication that he would "be pleased to join the club as an Hon. Life Member".

The new King was invited to become the first Patron of Leander Club on his accession to the throne in 1936. The King's secretary at the time was the first Lord Wigram, whose grandson would become a GB junior rower and Henley Steward. He wrote that 'his Majesty would be graciously pleased to become Patron' and the Minutes record that 'the news was greeted with loud cheers'.




However the patronage was shortlived, and ceased at the point of his abdication, when his brother became King. During Coronation Week the Committee agreed to floodlight the clubhouse, and when they next met they agreed to write to the Duke of Kent (younger brother of Edward VIII and George VI) to invite him to become a Life Member, and the Duke's letter of acceptance was read to the next meeting.

Following the death of her father in 1952, Queen Elizabeth gladly consented to become our next

As Chairman of Henley Royal
Regatta, Mike Sweeney had the
privilege of meeting Her Majesty at
Buckingham Palace in 2006, when
she presided over a small ceremony.
The Rector of Imperial College
handed over a new trophy to the
Regatta - The Prince Albert Challenge
Cup. "It was a pleasure to be in
her company and to appreciate her
interest and understanding of the
rowing world" said Mike afterwards.

Royal Patron and the Committee unanimously decided that the Dukes of Windsor, Gloucester, and Edinburgh also be offered Hon. Membership.

Despite her long service as our Patron Her Majesty never actually ventured inside our clubhouse during her reign. Her signature, which is framed in the library, dates from the time when she visited Henley to christen a new lifeboat, and used the opportunity to visit Leander, and sign the visitors' book on a table which was specially laid out in the garden!



Her Majesty's son, the Prince of Wales, now King Charles III, was elected an Hon. Member of Leander in 1974, and so the story continues.

LEANDER Vicky Thornley's Journey to the Olympics

Rowing Greats: 7 questions for Victoria Thornley



Olympic silver-medallist Vicky Thornley is a former equestrian rider and model and the first graduate of the Sporting Giants scheme to win a medal.

How did you get into rowing?

A few months before going to university, I had applied to the Sporting Giants campaign. A month after moving to London, I was selected for the World Class Start programme to train in Bath with my coach, Paul Stannard. Rowing was a now or never opportunity, so I left university and moved to Bath.

I started rowing in November 2007 and won Gold in the women's eight at the 2009 U23 World Championships. The following year I was asked to train with the senior team, moving to Henley and joining Leander Club.

My first senior World Championships was in 2010 in the women's eight where we finished fifth. In 2011 we won bronze and qualified for the London Olympics, and in London I stroked the eight to a 5th place finish.

In 2013 and 2014 I raced the single scull, finishing 7th and 8th respectively. Dame Katherine Grainger and I formed a double in 2015 and finished 6th at the World Championships. In Rio 2016 we won a silver medal. After Rio, my goal was to be in Tokyo in the single scull.

from over-training, missing the Europeans and World Championships. 2019 was a long road back to fitness and form, and in an extremely competitive World Championships, I qualified the boat for the Tokyo Olympics finishing 4th. This was the first time in 20 years that a GB women's single scull had qualified for a Games.

2020 brought Covid and a delayed Tokyo Olympics. In 2021, we finally got to race at a very different sort of Olympics, producing the best performances of my career and finishing 4th.



Your single scull project?

In 2017, I started the single project with Paul Reedy as my coach, a relationship that was integral to how much I enjoyed the next five years, even on the really bad days! That year I became European Champion, and won silver at the World Championships, a brilliant start to the Tokyo Olympiad. However, in 2018 I suffered

Your top three races?

The three I am most proud of are:-

- 1. The Olympic Silver in Rio. We were huge underdogs, but we stepped up when it mattered.
- 2. Qualifying the single for the Olympics in 2019. I had really to get back to fitness and form after over-training, and had to dig deep



into my motivation and self-beliet to deliver those races. The quality and intensity at those World Championships was insane, and I have never been as nervous as I was before that semi-final. I had to finish in the top three to qualify and enjoy the A final. But if I was in the B final I would have had to finish top three, (as nine qualified from a 39 strong field) and no-one wanted to be in that race!

3. The semi-final and final in Tokyo, the best performances of my career.

What's so special about being a Leander Club Member?

You are part of such an incredible club, the history and success that has come before you is inspiring. The club also feels like a second home. Whenever I was having bad times in rowing, whether that was selection issues in the team or I was struggling in my performance, I always knew I had the support of the club and the coaches there. The fact that we are such a successful club helps inspire you to deliver great performances. And the pink lycra of course!

What skills has rowing taught you?

Rowing is an incredible sport but it's seriously tough, so without resilience and dedication you won't go very far. The saying, "Hard work will beat talent, when talent doesn't work hard" is absolutely the case. I have definitely learnt that I am capable of more than I thought, and if you want something enough you will find new limits and surprise yourself. I want to keep that work ethic and discipline in what I do next.•

What would you say to Leander squad rowers now?

Remember it is a privilege to be able to do the sport you love every day, it won't last forever so try and

enjoy even the bad days. Do the basics well. Be a sponge for information, learn from everyone around you, ask lots of questions.

Vicky was Captain of Leander from 2018 to 2020

What are you doing now?

In 2020 I married fellow Olympian Rick Edgington and we live near Henley.

I am now working with my Dad in the family business. We have a residential caravan park in Cheshire and a holiday lodge park in Shropshire. My Dad, after running the business for more than 50 years, is looking to retire, so I have a lot to learn! I am loving spending more time with my parents, and feel very lucky I have this business to go into, it gives me a great focus which is what I needed after finishing rowing.

"Fundamentally our performance is the only thing we have control of - we can't slow anyone else down!"



LEANDER Henley Royal Regatta 2022

Record number of entries for HRR, four fantastic wins for Leander





In what was a record year for Henley Royal Regatta, Leander Club brought home four

victories: The Prince of Wales, The Ladies' Plate, The Remenham and The Grand!

On finals' day, the Prince of Wales quad of Jack Keating, Olly Costley, Bryn Ellery and Rory Harris, faced local neighbours Reading University. Leander stormed out of the starting blocks and led from start to finish always increasing their lead to win with an easily verdict.

Next it was the women's club pair of Sophia Heath and Annie Campbell-Orde who faced the USA national team pair. Both Sophia and Annie had also doubled up into a club women's 8 earlier in the regatta. Despite the Leander women putting in a fantastic effort, the USA crew led from start to finish.

Races for Leander crews were coming thick and fast with the Wargrave club women's 8 up next. This crew steered by Katy Ward and stroked by Sarah Ferris had beaten stiff competition to make the Sunday finals. The Thames crew on the Berkshire station led off the start, however the Leander crew

never let them get too far. The tenacity and fight never let up by these Leander women, however they were beaten to the line by Thames in a new course record.

Throughout the day's racing, Leander athletes in the British team raced across multiple senior events. In both the Grand Challenge cup and Remenham Challenge Cup 11 Leander athletes competed against the Australia national team crews.



Both British crews won their events in a clear demonstration of the strength of the current British rowing team.

All tension and hype had built towards the last Leander crew of the day to race, in The Ladies' Plate. Leander had not won this event since 2016. The crew stroked by Peter Lancashire gathered a large crowd as they boated from Leander. As the crew sat on the

start line, the supporters at Leander were waiting with baited breath.

From the first stroke, Leander made their intentions clear as they led coming out of the island. The crew then had their opposition, Cal Berkley (IRA National Champions), in their sights the whole way. An exciting race that went the full track, and at the finish line Leander won by 1 length.

"I am extremely proud of all the Leander crews for how they performed at the regatta. It was inspirational to watch them race and congratulations to all our athletes for some truly excellent racing. Of course, it was fantastic to win several events and we must add special congratulations to all our victors. Bring on the rest of the season!"

LEANDER Head of the Charles, USA

A brilliant win for Leander Club women and an impressive fifth place for the men, starting last



Leander Club sent 20 athletes and the Men's and Women's chief coaches, Matt Beechey and Ross Hunter, to represent them at this most prestigious event.

Conditions at Boston were calm early in the day but as the Championship crews lined up for the regatta's blue ribbon events, a strong tail wind started to blow down the course.

First up was the Men's event, led off by last year's winners, Washington, soon followed by the US senior team starting 4th.

Leander Club as a new overseas entry were back down the starting field in 20th, steered by Jack Tottem. After a fast start, Leander looked strong going through the first of the timing points in 2nd place just behind the US national team. Finding a strong rhythm through the middle section Leander were narrowly squeezed into 3rd at the 2nd timing point only 0.3 seconds behind 2nd place finishers, Syracuse. As Leander approached the final section of the race they were quickly closing in on the Danish national team crew and although cox Tottem did an excellent job of judging the overtake he had to move from the best racing line to do so and this no doubt affected the crew's time as they dropped to a very creditable 5th by the finish line.

Thirty minutes later, the women's crew stroked by Flo Donald started 19th. At the first timing marker the crew were in second place, less than one second behind Penn University. As the racing progressed, the Leander women looked strong as they worked their way through the field of women's eights in front of them. At the penultimate timing marker the Leander women still sat in 2nd place but showing grit and determination and excellent coxing by Morgan Baynham-Williams, they managed to finish the world famous championship course as winners.

This is such a fantastic result for not just the women's squad but the whole club and all its members.

This is indeed such an amazing result that the Women's Eight undoubtedly deserve pride of place on the back cover of this 2022 Review. Editor.

The Leander Club would like to thank Boston University for their incredible hospitality providing us with boats, oars and a beautiful boathouse in a prime location on the River Charles.

The incredible support of our members, in particular Paul Crudge, Dr Mark Ableson, and Sean and Bibi Colgan (The Colgan Foundation), made this trip happen. We are all so grateful to them. "The Head of the Charles is such an iconic event and to be part of it this year has been amazing. From the General Manager - reflecting on a year of change

With covid slowly becoming a distant (and rather bizarre) memory we reflect on a year of change at the club once again. Firstly, we must welcome a huge number of new members to our ranks: 193 since 1st January! A good influx of local and even not-so-local members have added to the buzz around the club both outside on the deck in the summer months and inside the club, more recently, as the rain started and didn't stop... After a very slow start in January the cub has gone from strength to strength. Covid still had it's tentacles all over the hospitality industry earlier in the year meaning that events were, generally, of much lower numbers in frequency and capacity than normal. Young athletes



At the 23 World Championships in Varese, Italy, British Women's & Leander athletes produced amazing performances. British took silver. All six Leander women returned with a medal.

To kickstart the medal haul, Leander athlete Katherine George partnered with Vwaire Obukohwo in the women's 2x. This event saw fierce racing with all crews still tightly packed at 1500m. Romania won gold, Canada took silver and the British women's 2x won bronze.

Next up was the women's four with three Leander women:- Phoebe Campbell, Lauren Carey and Lettie Cabot partnered with UL athlete Georgie Robinson Ranger. This crew was coached by Leander women's assistant coach Richard Chambers. USA took gold with the British four winning silver.

To complete the Leander medals for the day, Daisy Bellamy and Abigail Topp raced in the British Women's 8+. USA took gold and the British took silver.

The men's 4x with three Leander athletes and coached by Ali Brown, men's assistant coach, finished 7th overall.

Junior Squad/Kanghua

Unique partnership between Leander and Kanghua, bringing huge benefits to the Junior Squad

Leander's cadet group recently took delivery of a brand-new Kanghua KX quad. The KX is the top-of-the-range Kanghua, using the very latest in pre-preg carbon technology – not only for the hull, but the bow-mounted wing riggers too. This boat has a new design of rigger that maximises strength and rigidity, so it will be a great asset to the junior squad. It certainly looks good, with its chequered carbon interior, and first impressions out on the water were excellent.





The new Kanghua 4x is proving a great addition to the Leander fleet. Kanghua boats are constantly evolving to ensure that they stay ahead of the latest trends in boat design, construction and fittings.

Feedback from Leander athletes helps to drive these improvements and has contributed to the outstanding rigidity of Kanghua riggers and hulls, in both torsional and longitudinal directions.

LEANDER Wingfield Sculls

Congratulations to all athletes for providing exciting racing in challenging conditions



On 27 October Leander athletes took part in the 2022 Wingfield Sculls on the

Tideway Championship Course.

This event is steeped in history, dating back to its first race in 1830, with many famous winners in British sculling folklore.

This year Leander's Seb Deveraux lined up against the best of club sculling in the UK. Deveraux showed what great form he was in, in the lead from the very start, extending to a large margin by the milepost. The Tideway conditions didn't disappoint with rough and windy conditions that never allowed Deveraux to feel comfortable. Battling to keep

opening up his lead, Deveraux won in wonderful style.

The women's race was also very successful. Racing before the men, the women had slightly more favourable conditions. It was a fast start by all athletes with all still overlapping at Fulham Football Club. In a race that saw clashing and crashing, the eventual winner and current World Champion from Cambridge, Imogen Grant, got into a slight collision that allowed Leander scullers Imogen Magner and Becky Wilde to take the lead.

The grit and determination of Grant, however, took her back to the front of the field with Magner finishing second and Wilde in third place.

LEANDER Boston GB Trials

Strength in depth with a number of Personal Bests



With two full trailers and 57 athletes eager to show what they could do, Leander set off for a busy weekend in Boston, Lincolnshire. The trial was over two days starting with a 2k ergo test for all athletes on the Saturday. Leander athletes performed well on the ergo producing some strong scores including many PBs. Sunday was a 5k time trial on the River Witham in pairs and singles.

In the Open men's pairs category, Leander's Matt Rossiter and Jacob Dawson were the winners in style producing the fastest time of the day by 14 seconds. Felix Drinkall and Lenny Jenkins were in 3rd place and Ryan Todhunter in 4th with Nick Farrell and Josh Bowesman-Jones in 7th.

In the singles, Seb Devereux came 2nd overall – just 0.1 seconds off

winning overall. Leander showed strength in depth achieving six in the top eight of the men's singles. Miles Devereux was the fastest U23 sculler and gap year

Matt Long was the fastest U23 lightweight.

This year British Rowing had decreed that all the women had to race in singles. In the Open women's event Ruth Siddorn was Leander Club's fastest sculler, coming home in 6th place just ahead of Chloe Brew in 7th place. Leander women then finished with nine scullers between 10th and 21st place.

Head of the River and Women's Eights Head

A triumph over illness and injury Head of the River

Leander boated three eights this year. The course is raced in reverse of the upcoming Boat Race course.

Preparation was far from ideal due to injury and illness with many crew changes daily until the race itself.

Although losing top GB athletes was disappointing, this did give our younger athletes a fantastic opportunity.

The Club was placed 2nd, 4th and 11th. We were of course disappointed but considering the number of athletes unavailable, we did well to put three crews in the top 11, with only one club ahead of our top two.



The return of the Women Women's Eights Head of the River

The return of the Women's Eights Head since 2018, saw 266 crews race from Chiswick to Putney.

For the first time in its history, Leander fielded four women's eights. The Leander A boat, steered by Morgan Baynham-Williams were the first crew to start

and put on an impressive display. At each interval marker they had a significant winning margin, with a final verdict of 35 seconds ahead of the second placed crew.

LEANDER Club Projects and HRR 2023

Tackling the problems of space and some changes for HRR 2023

The club has been busy in the background tackling both space issues in the club on the house and rowing side whilst addressing some of the general wear and tear problems on all floors. Since the early summer outdoor kitchen project we have switched attention to the athletes' areas. With an influx of over 80 athletes for the new rowing season, space is understandably at a premium, particularly in the crew room. We have now converted the crew room annex to a fully fledged crew kitchen from which all meals are served. This can now be used by athletes to cook and prepare meals outside the standard meal times (second, third and fourth breakfasts are now all cater-able!). The space that used to house the rather tatty crew kitchen is now a smart banquette seating area adding another 20 seats to the space.



Concurrently, the builders have constructed a smart new regatta shop that fits to the awkward space adjacent to the club entrance. This provides a dry, clean and ergonomic set-up for regatta whilst significantly increasing storage space for the remainder of the year.

Lastly, this year, the gym will get a fresh coat of paint at the same time as embarking on a big lighting



overhaul adding much needed lumens for those cold winter nights and helping to address our esg commitments.

As mentioned previously in the club house review, we now look towards the garden works for 2023. The project aims to smarten up the garden through some extensive landscaping, the creation of two flat lawns with hedging and wall surrounds and a bonded gravel courtyard at the front of the club. The major part of these works is to create boat storage to house our small boats so that the garden remains clear all year round and have further racking space available to expand the Leander fleet. The boat storage will be designed in a way that it can convert to a bar and kitchen during regatta and to which the marquee can seamlessly fit. It is hoped that the landscaping will start mid January with boat storage construction a few months later enabling the club to benefit from the beginning of the summer season onwards.

Timma, our tireless communications manager will keep you updated with progress on all these projects via the Pink Posts throughout 2023.

"We had a lot of feedback on the regatta last year and, as the Chairman has noted to all, there will be various changes to the 2023 event. The garden project, combined with a new tent will produce a really stunning outdoor space to house our outdoor lunches and teas. We hope this will enable us to accommodate more meal requests this year with our new setup."

Notice of the Annual General Meeting 2023
