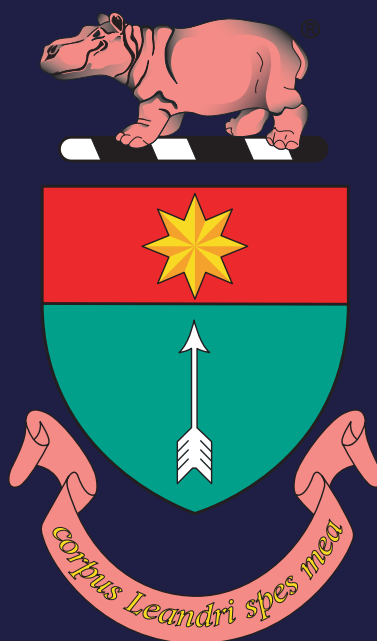

Changing lives

The Leander Trust helps change the lives of young athletes through the Leander Junior Programme.

The Leander Trust has now been supporting the Leander Junior Programme for more than 25 years. Over that period, we have seen many successes on the water with athletes from the junior programme going on to senior international rowing. When Harry Leask won a silver medal at the last Olympic Games few will remember him as one of the Club's juniors.

This year, the Programme has been particularly successful in producing not only the winning Fawley Cup crew but also saw two of that crew being selected to represent GB at the Junior World Championships. Byron Richards in the single and Nat Gauden in the 4x.

This year also saw previous athletes from the programme represent GB in the U23 World Championships where Joe Willis won a gold

final in the 1x and was also a reserve athlete at the Senior World Championships.

Athletes joining the programme often have little or no previous rowing experience and combine their rowing with their education mainly at Henley College. While many are local boys, we have seen athletes leave home at 16

from as far away as Edinburgh and Nottingham to join the programme and study at Henley College while staying with families in Henley.

While their prowess on the water is easy to see, what is not often seen is their academic achievements which coupled with their rowing has in the past led to offers from prestigious universities in the USA.

California Berkeley, Dartmouth, Yale, Columbia, Syracuse, Princeton and Stanford. These are life changing opportunities and ones we should be justly proud.

Another important part of the Trust's work is supporting other junior (boys and girls) rowing programmes. Last year, this included Hinksey Sculling School which raced in the final of the Fawley Cup this year.

The Trust is reliant upon donations and legacies to fund this programme and we would like to be able to contribute more to the costs the athletes face but need your

support to do so.

While between the Club and the Trust the coaching costs, equipment, training camp and regattas fees are broadly covered the athletes still have to cover the costs of living in Henley as well as international selection and attending international regattas with the GB rowing team. The GB selection process can amount to over £4,000 a year for an athlete representing GB at the Junior Worlds.

The right people for the jobs

In June 2021 we appointed Matt Beechey as Chief Coach of the Men's Squad and Ross Hunter as Chief Coach of the Women's Squad. Matt had first joined the coaching team in 2009 while Ross came on board in 2015.

Their first few weeks in charge found them preparing our crews for the postponed Henley Royal Regatta, held in August 2021. At this Covid-impacted event, the Club had its most successful Regatta to date, winning eight Trophies.

Matt and Ross have created a very positive climate and culture for the squads training at the Club. They have also fostered a very open and welcoming attitude to other clubs. More than 15 universities, clubs and schools have visited the club during this year, many of which have trained alongside our Thames Cup and Wargrave crews.

One of the most significant changes over the past five years has been the increase in the numbers of the women's squad. In 2018 we had just ten women training at Leander. In 2023 the number had increased to 30. For the 2023 season there were 30 men and 30 women training in our two main squads.

Ali Brown joined the coaching team in 2018, and is the High

Richard Chambers is the Assistant Women's Coach; he is a World Champion and an Olympic silver medallist. He joined the Leander

coaching team in September 2021. For the World Championships this year he was seconded to the British Team and was responsible for coaching the Women's Eight and Pair - all Leander rowers!

Jonathan Jackson is in charge of our junior and development squads. He joined the team in 2020 and is also

undertaking a recruitment role within the club. In 2023 he gave the opportunity to more than 100 state school children to try indoor rowing and also ran an indoor rowing competition in Wokingham.

For the past two years we have been running an Apprentice Coaches scheme. Jamie Axon and Cat Copeland were the first to be employed under this scheme. Jamie Axon went on to become the Men's Coach at Marlow Rowing Club and Kat Copeland is just finishing a year of maternity leave. This year's candidate, Emma Chenery, has just accepted a place coaching with RGS High Wycombe.

A review of Mike Sweeney's five years as Leander President

Mike was elected as President of Leander at the AGM in 2018, starting his five year term of office in September. After the excitement and flurry of all the special activities in the 2018 Bicentenary year he was looking forward to a rather more routine and less challenging period for his Presidency. Wrong!

In Mike's five years the Club was hammered by Covid for two years - Henley Royal Regatta was

cancelled - the Tokyo Olympics were postponed - a new Chairman was elected - a new General Manager was appointed - the bar and the dining room were completely refurbished - the size of the outside decking was doubled - an outside bar and kitchen was built - the garden was remodelled - a new boat shed was erected. The Club has seen a significant increase in the number of its female rowers and it has made important changes to its coaching structure. Routine - No - Challenging - Yes.

Reflecting back over his five years Mike was asked to pick out a number of the most significant events - lowlights and highlights. His definite lowlight was the impact of Covid when the world changed in March 2020. Mike was so impressed with the way that the rowers and coaches coped, first with training in isolation (ergometers in the garage) and then with the constraints of ergometers in a marquee in the Leander garden. They had to endure months with no training on the water.

In June 2020 Al Heathcote joined as the Club's new General Manager, being set some challenging targets by the Committee on his appointment - in particular, to boost the footfall into the Clubhouse and to develop the Club as a 'destination club' for all the Members and visitors. After the renovations inside the Clubhouse in 2020 the grand opening of the new decking and the outside bar took place on 5th June 2021 and was a great success.

In June 2021 the Committee was delighted to announce the appointment of Matt Beechey as the new Men's Squad Chief Coach and Ross Hunter as the New Women's Squad Chief Coach. At the August edition of Henley Royal Regatta, the Club had its most successful Regatta to date, winning eight Trophies.

The rowing events at the postponed Tokyo Olympics were held in July



2021 with Leander providing 24 athletes to compete in the Olympic and Paralympic Games. The best result was a Silver Medal in the Men's Quadruple Sculls - the first ever Olympic medal for GB in this class of boat. The Quad contained four Leander scullers

who had all come through the Leander Development Squad. The British Eight, containing six Leander athletes, won the Bronze Medal.



At the Head of the Charles in October 2022 the Leander women's eight won the Championship Eights event while the men's eight came fifth. To end the year the Club posted a stunning set of results at the Fours Head of the River by winning all six open events as well as the Junior men's quads.

Leander athletes have been key members of the Great Britain teams at the European Senior Championships, the World Junior

Championships and the World Under 23 Championships. At Henley Royal Regatta the Club had 60 athletes racing on Finals day.

At the World Senior Championships in Belgrade the British Team of 62 athletes included 30 of our Leander rowers. Leander athletes came home with five Gold medals, two Silver medals and two Bronze medals.

"I retired as President of Leander Club on 31st August 2023 after an exhilarating and challenging five years. However, there are further challenges ahead for my successor, not least being the management of access to the Club during the last few days of the Regatta.

We are now most definitely the best place to be at the end of the Regatta each day – we are just too attractive!"

LEANDER *Meet the New President*



Dick Lester

When did you first become a member of Leander?

I joined the Cadet scheme in 1969, won the Thames

Cup in 1970 and have been a member ever since. I won the Grand in 1975 stroking a Leander Thames Tradesmen composite crew.

Was there a defining moment in your rowing career?

Leander won the Thames Cup in 1968, 69 and 70 coached by Derek Drury and Donald Leggett. The Club dominated the event for those years. The defining moment of my career was therefore to discover winning the Thames Cup did not guarantee success

at international regattas. Clearly, things had to change in order to step up on the international stage. Fortuitously, the ARA as it then was wisely employed the services of Bob Janousek.

What has motivated you to stay so long and in so many different roles?

Since retiring from rowing in 1976 I have coached at Leander, Cambridge University and the National Squad and was a member of the International Selection Board in the 1980s. I have been a Steward for more than 40 years, served on the Regatta's Committee of Management and am a Trustee of the HRR Charitable Trust. For several years, I was legal adviser to the ARA and the Royal Albert Dock Trust. As to motivation, I never went looking for some of

these roles, they just found me!

How do you see your role as the President of the Club?

The organisation required to run a rowing club today is enormous by comparison with 50 years ago - increasingly so. Leander must continue striving for success on both land and water to maintain its large and successful rowing squad whilst also providing a first-class experience for the membership on land. The Club has an excellent team of coaches and staff supported by a dedicated Committee and I see my role as President to support these where best I can.

The Seventies Revival

Olympians from the 1970's and 1980's on the resurgence of British Rowing from 1968-1980

In the 1970s, British rowing at the international level emerged from the doldrums of the 1950s and 60s and we started to win medals again!

The story of this transformation was the theme of a Friday Supper evening in March. Taking us through the period from 1968 to 1980 were Mike Sweeney, Chairman of Selectors and Team Manager, Tim Crooks, World and Olympic Silver Medallist, Dick Lester, Olympic Silver Medallist and Charlie Wiggin, Olympic Bronze Medallist.

The evening proved to be a most interesting and entertaining event. Tim Crooks tried to pack into ten minutes his whole life story, Dick Lester gave us some previously embargoed stories about Bob Janousek's Montreal Eight and Charlie Wiggin surprised us all by describing his early days as a ballet dancer!

LEANDER *On the Tideway*

Men's Head of the River

On Saturday 18th March, Leander entered three crews in The Head of the River Race from Mortlake to Putney.



Leander's top boat started second behind a strong Oxford Brookes crew containing eight World Champions from last summer's World Championships. Our eight contained a mixture of GB team members and club athletes. A tremendous battle then ensued between these two top class crews with Oxford Brookes finally prevailing but only by 1.9 seconds. Our two club based eights came in 5th and 12th – a very satisfactory result.

Women's Head of the River

On Saturday 4th March, 30 Leander athletes took to the Tideway for the annual Women's Head of the River. In what was an impressive display of women's rowing in the UK a total of 320 crews totalling 2,880 athletes raced down the Tideway course from Mortlake to Putney.

Leading the field as defending champions was the Leander A crew with two-time Olympian and Olympic silver medallist Karen Bennett in the bow seat. Conditions were favourable and with a clear run the Leander A crew stormed down the track to take the overall victory. Our club-based crew finished second overall with our young development crew finishing in a very worthy 7th place.



Oxford and Cambridge

In pre-Boat Race fixtures our men's top club eight raced the Oxford University Blue Boat from Putney to Chiswick Steps. In a hard fought race, with the lead changing hands three times, Oxford won by just over a length in difficult windy conditions.

In their set of three races with the Cambridge Women's Blue Boat our first eight lost the first piece by one third of a length but then won the next two pieces by 1 length and by a third of a length respectively.

Annual Club Dinner 2023

Fun with a serious purpose



Leander members raised £4,000 for charity at their Club Dinner on Friday, 20th January, when

two of the club's rowing legends enthralled a packed house with tales from their sporting careers.

Olympic medallists Debbie Bruwer, who won silver in Athens and Beijing, and Angus Groom, a silver medallist in Tokyo, have both retired from international rowing. Both drew parallels between their sport and their new lives, even for non-rowing members of the

audience! Debbie now manages the Henley Debt Centre, which received half the proceeds of the evening, while Angus works in a team at Oxford exploring the causes of leukaemia.

The other charity to benefit from the auction was The Leander Trust, which supports young rowers including the Junior Rowing Programme at Leander.

Record entry, record results



Henley Woman's Regatta

Leander Club put forward a record entry for this year's HWR. Nine crews were entered along with two composite entries in the women's double and women's pair. This was also the first time Leander had crews entered across all women's Championship events.

Racing began on Friday with time trials for all crews. All our Leander crews made it through to the knock out stages of racing. Quarter-final racing on Saturday went well leading to seven crews needing to be ready for semi-finals on Sunday morning. Four of these crews made it through to the finals.

The women's composite double of Kathryn George and Vwairé Obukohwo (Twickenham Club) faced off against a GB development crew in the final and showed their strength and power to win overall.



The women's composite pair of Abi Topp and Phoebe Snowden (UL)

raced well in the final but were unable to match the speed of the UL/IC crew. Both of these athletes then joined forces with the U23 group to race at HRR.

In the final of the Championship quad sculls Leander 'A' beat Molesey by just over five seconds and in the Championship fours Leander 'A' beat Durham University by 10 seconds.

A record 104 Leander athletes competed at this year's Henley Royal Regatta – 73 athletes competed in the semi-finals and 60 reached finals day. An impressive 23 Leander athletes took home medals.

The first win of the day was The Princess Grace Challenge Cup. This GB women's national squad crew contained three Leander athletes and was a comfortable winner over the Canadian national squad crew racing as Shawnigan Lake.

The Prince of Wales Challenge Cup, the intermediate men's quad event, was won by Leander's development squad athletes and was coached by club coach Ali Brown. In the final the crew beat Hollandia Roeiclub from the Netherlands.

The Town Challenge Cup was won by our GB women's national squad crew, containing two of our senior Leander athletes. In the final they found themselves up against the Leander development crew who had done extremely well to reach the final.

One of the most thrilling finals of the day was in The Queen Mother Challenge Cup for international men's quads. The GB national

crew contained two of our Leander scullers and found themselves up against the reigning World Champions from Poland. The final result was a half a length victory to the British crew.

The Silver Goblets and Nickalls' Challenge Cup for men's pairs was won by Leander's Tom George and Ollie Wynne-Griffith beating the Canadian national crew in the final.

Another Great Britain versus Canada clash took place in The Grand Challenge Cup with the British eight, containing four Leander athletes, winning comfortably over the Canadian national eight.

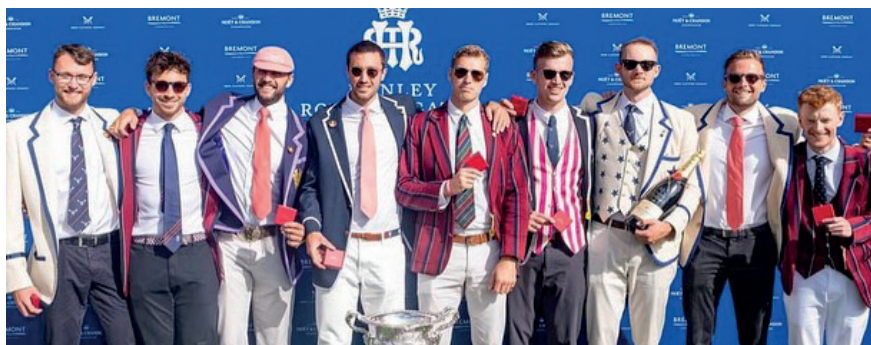

LEANDER World Championships



At the World Senior Championships in Belgrade, Serbia the British Team of 62 athletes included 30 of our Leander rowers. GB finished with nine crews winning medals and qualified 13 boats for the 2024 Paris Olympic and Paralympic Games. Great Britain was placed second on the overall medal table and tied first on the number of gold medals.

The World gold in the Men's eight was won in impressive style by Great Britain and included four Leander athletes – Jacob Dawson, Sholto Carnegie, Charlie Elwes and Tom Ford.



The Women's quad raced neck and neck with the Netherlands over the whole course, only hitting the front in the last few metres to win the Gold medal. The crew included Leander's Hannah Scott, Lola Anderson and Georgie Brayshaw.

Also winning a Gold medal was Erin Kennedy who coxed the British PR3 Mixed Coxed Four.

Notice of the Annual General Meeting 2024

The Annual General Meeting of Leander Club Limited for the year 2024 will be held at the Clubhouse, Henley on Thames on Sunday 30th June 2024 at 11 am.

In accordance with the Articles of Association Directors shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting and shall hold office for a three-year term and may be re-elected, subject to not exceeding six consecutive years in total.
