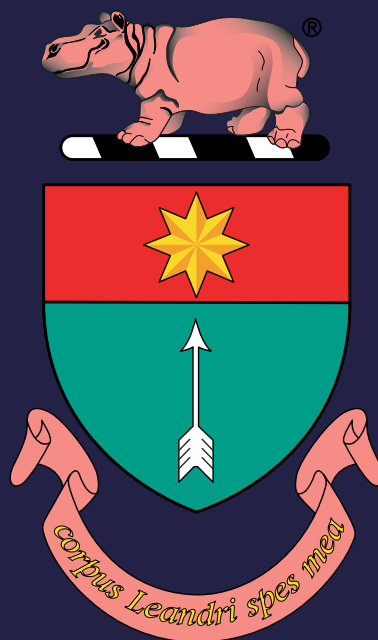

Anniversary of HRR win

Just before the 2023 HRR, Leander archivist Robert Treharne Jones wrote:

'Founded in 1926 by the legendary Steve Fairbairn, the 4¼ mile Head of the River Race over the

Championship course signals the end of the long distance steady-state training period before the regatta season gets under way, and this year marks 50 years since Leander first won the Head trophy in 1973.

London RC were early winners for many years, while composite clubs like Barn Cottage and Tideway Scullers made their mark in the post-war years before Leander's first win, and the newly-formed GB National Squad (albeit with several Leander men on board) won the lion's share of pennants for many years. Fast forward to the new millennium, and Leander became the dominant force but, since dead-heating with Brookes in 2018, it's the Oxford-based powerhouse which goes into this year's race as reigning champions, with Leander looking to overhaul them with their 15th win in the history of the race on 18th March.'

"Leander may not have prevailed in the 50th anniversary year but we did this year!"

Double Success

Women's Head of the River

Leander was victorious at the Women's HORR! The winning crew of Abby Topp, Amelia Standing, Charlotte Fennell, Phoebe Snowden, Juliette Perry, Philippa Emery, Daisy Bellamy, Issy Powell, and cox Henry Fieldman took the win by 3.8 seconds in difficult weather conditions over Oxford Brookes in 2nd place. The 'B' boat finished in a creditable 9th position.

Men's Head of the River

In the absence of our international athletes, who were away on camp in preparations for the Olympics, it was an opportunity for our development club-based men to fly the flag for Leander at this year's HRR.



The Leander 'A' of Matt Rowe, Dan Graham, Douwe De Graaf, Sam Bannister, Miles Beeson, Tobias Schröder, Tom Ballinger, James Vogel, and cox Jack Tottem raced superbly to a new course record of 16:26.7 over a strong Oxford Brookes crew in second place. Leander Club last held the Headship in 2018 when we dead-heated, but it is 2015 since Leander were outright winners.

Our 2nd and 3rd boats, containing some scullers and our gap year athletes, were placed 5th and 9th respectively.

"We are delighted with the results. Winning overall and placing all three boats in the top 10 was the aim. It is also the first time the Club has held both the Men's and Women's Headships since 2011."

The Friday of Henley Women's Regatta started with a great set of time trials for our sweep boats all progressing through to their first round of racing. Our women's pair gained a bye into Sunday's racing where they defeated competition from University College Dublin, then Schuylkill Navy USA to progress to a final against Thames Rowing Club. After a good fight and strong race plan, the pair of Amelia Standing and Juliette Perry raced through to win the Redgrave Challenge Vase.

Our two women's eights also had strong racing progressions with the 2nd eight beating off international crews from Southern Methodist University and then faced tough opposition from Oxford Brookes 'B' who unfortunately knocked them out of the regatta.

Our 1st eight knocked out British crews of Thames 'B', Durham 'A' and Newcastle 'A' before facing, but not beating, a strong Oxford Brookes 'A' crew in the final.

Racing in the Avril Vellacott Cup for Championship 4-, we had two women's crews. Leander 'A' defeated Molesey 'B' before facing Leander 'B' which had beaten Upper Thames 'B' the previous evening. Leander 'A' continued to defeat challenges from Oxford Brookes 'A' to meet Molesey 'A' in the final. An outstanding performance meant they won by a substantial four-length margin.

Our sculling squad started racing on Saturday with a strong time trial from all. We had two women's quads and a women's double.

Having progressed through the time trial, the double gained great experience racing Molesey 'BC' despite not being about to overhaul them. Our two quads had great campaigns with Leander 'A' gaining a bye to face Leander 'B' which had beaten Reading University to progress. Leander 'A' continued to a great final in the Borne Challenge Cup against a composite from the GB performance sculling

academy, despite a great race displaying exactly what side-by-side racing entails, our quad fell short of victory by just a quarter of a length.

LEANDER Henley Royal Regatta 2024

WINNERS HRR 2024



In this Olympic year the British Team for Paris, including 24 Leander rowers, did not race at Henley Royal Regatta. However, we entered 12 Club crews made up of 59 athletes and reached Saturday's semi-finals across 10 events.

Six crews went through to the Sunday finals and we came away with four wins. With the threat of lightning later in the day the racing was brought forward and started at 9.30am.

The first win of the day came in The Double Sculls Challenge Cup where Jamie Gare and Cedol Dafydd recorded a comfortable two-length win over an American composite double.

Twenty minutes later, in the open event for women's fours – The Town Challenge Cup – our four

of Lauren Carey, Sophie Houston, Philippa Emery and Abby Topp led the crew from Rowing Canada 'A' for most of the race but eventually lost by $\frac{3}{4}$ of a length.

Our next victory came in The Visitors' Challenge Cup where our 'A' crew of Bruce Turnell, Joshua Bowesman-Jones, Pete Lancashire and Calvin Tarczy led all the way to win by a length over a combined Oxford Brookes and Taurus Boat Club crew.

In the final of The Queen Mother Challenge Cup for open men's quads our crew faced tough opposition from a composite German crew. Leander were down at the Barrier but ahead at Fawley. The race remained very close but Leander crossed the finish line first by $\frac{2}{3}$ of a length. The crew was Rory Harris, Tobias Schröder, Stephen Hughes and Liam Smit.

The fourth win of the day was provided by our intermediate men's quad in The Prince of Wales Challenge Cup. The crew of Jack Keating, Oliver Costley, Levin Graf and Miles Devereux had a great race with the Dutch crew from Sköll, coming through to win by just one length.

The penultimate race of the day was the final of The Stewards' Challenge Cup where our Leander crew fought a very tight battle with the four from Oxford Brookes University. We led at the Barrier and at Fawley but could not stop the Brookes crew from taking the lead and the eventual win.

"It was a great day displaying our strength in depth across the men's squad with 18 Club men in finals and 14 coming home with a red box. Winning all the men's crew sculling was also very special."

Visitors to Leander during the regatta were invited to place bids to have their chosen name inscribed on the club's top men's Empacher eight. The winning bid was from our US-based Members, Bill and Mary Way, who chose the name Fit Via Vi, which translates as 'the way is by strength'.

During a ceremony at Leander on Sunday 7 July, led by Leander Club Chairman, Pete Bridge, Mr Way, CEO and founder of Fit

Via Vi, a financing and production company, christened the boat with a bottle of Digby Leander Pink. Fit Via Vi will be the top men's eight for the next five years.

All over the world

European Championships – Szeged, Hungary

For the European Championships Great Britain entered 60 athletes in the Olympic events with Leander providing 26 competitors. Eleven of our athletes brought home Gold medals while eight of our athletes won Silver medals.

At World Cup I Great Britain entered 50 athletes in the Olympic events including 26 athletes from Leander. Nine of our athletes won Gold medals while 12 of our athletes brought home Silver medals.

At World Cup II Great Britain entered 48 athletes in the Olympic events including 25 athletes from Leander. Eleven of our athletes won Gold medals while eight of our athletes brought home Silver medals.

The GBR Under 23 Team were remarkably successful at the World Under 23 Championships in Canada.

42 athletes were selected to race for Great Britain including 12 from Leander. Eight of our athletes won Gold medals while one athlete brought home a Bronze medal.

LEANDER Paris Olympics and Paralympics 2024

Great Britain back at the top



The hugely successful British Olympic

Team in Paris included 24 Leander rowers. There were fifteen women, seven men and two men reserves, spread amongst seven crews. Leander athletes won seven Gold medals, four Silver medals and nine Bronze medals.

Pride of place goes to the two Gold medal winning crews, the men's eight and the women's quad. The men's eight included Sholto Carnegie, Jacob Dawson, Charlie Elwes and was stroked by Tom Ford. Before the start their main challengers appeared to be the Americans and the Dutch. Indeed, the Dutch led to 500m but at this point the British eight drew level. After 1,000m the British slowly moved ahead but the margin over the Dutch was never more than ½ a length. The final verdict was just ¼ of a length.



The women's quad included Hannah Scott, Lola Anderson and was stroked by Georgina Brayshaw. The Dutch again were seen as their greatest opposition and led at 500m with the British half a length behind in third place. At the 1,000m we were still half a length behind but now in second place. We were still half a length behind with 150m to go before mounting an amazing sprint over the last 20 strokes to win by around two feet!



Silver medals were won by the women's four and by the men's pair. The four included Esme Booth and Sam Redgrave. After a steady start we had moved into second place by 1,000m and were only four feet down on the Dutch. Over the second half of the course there was a tremendous battle, occasionally the bows of the British boat nosing ahead but more often than not the Dutch leading by a few feet. In the surge for the line the Dutch held on to win by around four feet.

The men's pair of Ollie Wynne-Griffith and Tom George were one of the favourites for this event but faced stiff opposition from the pairs from Switzerland, Romania and

Croatia. The British pair led for the majority of the race with the Romanians pushing them hard all the way. Approaching the finish it looked as if the British pair would get to the line first but an astonishing sprint from the Croatians and a slight wobble from the British meant that the Croatians won by just 0.45 seconds.



The British women's eight included seven Leander rowers – Heidi Long, Rowan McKellar, Emily Ford, Lauren Irwin, Eve Stewart, Harriet Taylor and stroked by Annie Campbell-Orde. The cox was Henry Fieldman. As expected the Romanians led at 1,000m



with the Canadians second and the British third. By 1,500m it was clear that the Romanians were going to claim the Gold medal but that there would be a great battle for the other two medals between the Canadians, the British and the Americans. The British eight won the Bronze medal just 0.67 seconds behind the Canadians.

The least expected medal at the Olympic Regatta came from the British women's double which included Becky Wilde. This was all the more surprising as they only qualified for the Olympics at the final Qualification Regatta. They raced brilliantly throughout and came away with a thoroughly deserved Bronze medal.

The women's pair of Chloe Brew and Rebecca Edwards came 5th in their semi-final.

The two men's reserves were Leander members James Robson and Will Stewart.

In the Paralympics two weeks later the British PR3 mixed coxed four, coxed by Leander's Erin Kennedy, continued their long unbeaten run, winning Gold yet again.

LEANDER Multiple Medals!

Lola Anderson – Club Captain and Olympic Gold Medallist



Lola Anderson went to school at Surbiton High School where she took up rowing, a sport that she very quickly proved to be good at. In 2015 she competed for Great Britain in the Coupe de la Jeunesse, an annual European international event for juniors. Lola raced in the junior women's quad sculls and won two Gold medals. In 2016 she competed in the World Rowing Under 19 Championships in Rotterdam where she won a Silver medal in the junior women's quad sculls.

Lola went to Newcastle University to study English Literature, graduating in 2018. She continued to train and to scull, becoming a member of the British Under 23 Team. In 2019, racing in the Under 23 composite quad, she won Gold at the Henley Women's Regatta. She then went on to the World Under 23 Championships in Sarasota-Bradenton, USA, winning the Gold medal in the women's quad.

In 2020 Lola joined Leander Club and in 2021 she became a member of the National Squad, training at Caversham. At the

2021 World Cup in Sabaudia, Italy she won a Bronze medal in the women's single sculls and at Henley Royal Regatta she won The Princess Royal Challenge Cup. In the final she beat Lauren Henry from Leicester Rowing Club by three feet!

In 2022, in Munich, Lola became European Champion in the women's quad sculls. At the World Championships in Racice, Czech Republic, the British women's quad won the Bronze medal. However, in 2023 at the World Championships in Belgrade, with two changes to the crew (including the inclusion of Lauren Henry), the British women's quad raced from behind in the final to overtake the Dutch crew a few strokes before the line to win the Gold medal.

Lola was elected Captain of Leander Club for 2024. She continued training at Caversham with her quad. They entered the first World Cup in Varese, Italy but only managed fourth place. However,



swift improvement saw the quad win the European Championships in Szeged, Hungary and then the Gold at the World Cup in Lucerne.

The win by the British quad at the Paris Olympics was an absolutely epic race with the Dutch crew leading all the way only to be



overhauled literally 'on the line' by Lauren, Hannah, Lola and Georgie – what a finish!

During the run-up to the Olympics the media caught up with the story of Lola and her father.

Apparently, inspired by the 2012 London Olympics, Lola wrote in her diary that she wanted to win an Olympic medal. Doubting herself, she ripped out the page. Her dad found it and kept it. Seven years later he handed the note back to her before sadly passing away. Lola dedicated her rowing career to him, becoming World Champion in the women's quad in 2023, securing Britain's first gold in that event since 2010.

Erin Kennedy MBE – Paralympic Gold Medallist



Erin Kennedy is best known as the coxswain of the indomitable Paralympic mixed coxed four and for talking publicly about her journey with breast cancer and her fight to return to international competition.

Erin is an Oxford University graduate, becoming a member of Leander Club in 2015. She joined the GB Rowing Team just two years after graduating and guided the PR3 mixed coxed four to Gold in her first World Championships in 2018 in Bulgaria. This golden success was repeated at the World Championships in Austria in 2019. The following year the COVID pandemic swept the world and the 2020 Tokyo Paralympics were postponed.

In 2021 Erin was back with her PR3 mixed coxed four and together they won the European Championships in Italy followed by winning the Gold medal at the postponed Tokyo Paralympics. Erin is a world record holder and is also

the only cox to ever hold all three major titles at once – Europeans, World and Paralympics.

In May 2022, Erin was diagnosed with Breast Cancer and, perhaps unsurprisingly for those that know her well, decided to fly out to the World Cup in Serbia the following day to compete. This set the tone for how she wanted



to deal with her diagnosis and with the full support of her team, despite being on chemotherapy at the time, competed in and won the European Championships in Munich in August 2022. She then took a break from rowing to focus on her treatment plan.

Erin was awarded an MBE in the 2022 New Year's Honours List for Services to Rowing.

Erin made her return to international competition in May 2023 exactly a year to the day after her diagnosis, following recovery from a double mastectomy just four months earlier. Her PR3 mixed coxed four won the European Championships in Bled, Slovenia and the World Championships in Belgrade, Serbia.

In 2024 Erin coxed the PR3 mixed coxed four to the Gold medal at the Paris Paralympics. If she retires now her run of victories over seven years will be almost impossible to beat by any other cox in the future.

After Leander's success at the Head of the Charles in both the last two years the Club took 23 athletes to this year's event – arguably the greatest Head Race in the World.

It is an expensive trip, only made possible by the Colgan Foundation and by other generous Leander Members, to whom the Club is extremely indebted.

The appearance and success of our crews at the Head sends a powerful message to all our current American Members and also to our future American Members!

For the second time in three years, the Leander women took the overall win in the Women's Championship 8+ event. Seven Olympic medallists returned to Leander to race in their club colours. The crew was challenged by USA favourites; Yale and the University of Washington, who put up great fights to finish second, third and fourth.

Olympic Bronze medallist Becky Wilde and her Paris 2024 doubles partner, Mathilda Hodgkins-Byrne (Upper Thames), took an impressive win in the Women's Championship doubles.

The winners of the Men's Championship 8+ was Cambridge University. The Leander crew finished 14th after a time penalty.

Former Leander athletes, Henry and Louisa Palmer (nee Rowbotham) raced with their two children, Callum, 12 and Skye, 10,

in the Mixed 2x and Parent Child 2x events. Skye set the record for being the youngest ever HOCR competitor, beating her brother's record.

The Leander Library Rowing Book Talks in aid of The Leander Trust

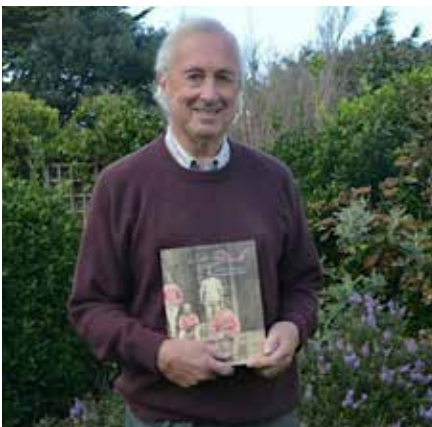


The series of rowing book talks organised by Leander Club librarian, Irene Hewlett – to raise funds for the Leander Trust – continued during the year.

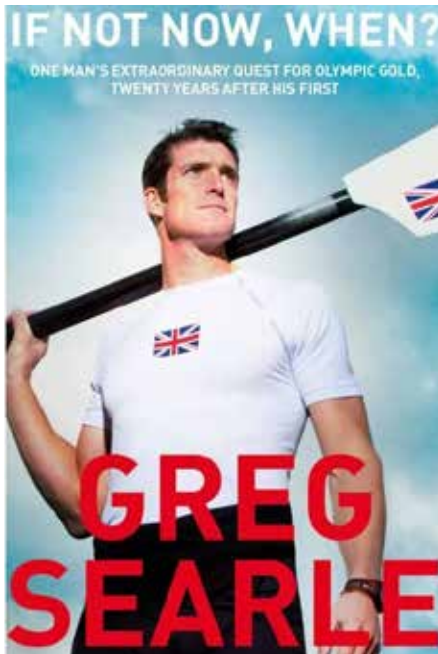
The Leander Trust

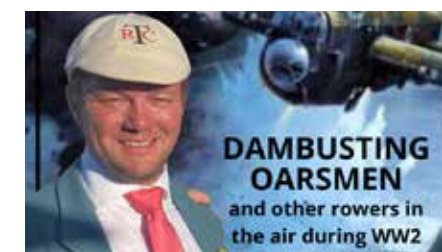

Notice of the Annual General Meeting 2025

The Annual General Meeting of Leander Club Limited for the year 2025 will be held at the Clubhouse, Henley-on-Thames on Sunday 22 June 2025 at 11 am.
